

Characteristics of a List Poem

- Typical poem topics include a list of items, people, places, or ideas
 - Often contains repetition
 - Can include rhyme
- Usually not a random list; instead ideas are well thought out
- Many times the last item in the list is strong, funny, or important

How to write your List Poem...

Step 1: What do you want to write a List Poem about? Here are some suggestions...

- Something my brother or sister does that I hate...
- My day...
- What I do when I'm alone...
- Things to do in the rain...
- Music is...
- Things I wish I could do...
- Beautiful things...
- What I hear in the morning...
- I am...
- Things I wish I didn't have to do...
- Things I do when no one is paying attention...
- Ways to show I'm sorry...
- Remote Learning...

Step 2: Write your chosen topic as your Title.

Step 3: Begin listing ideas, images, thoughts, sounds, sights or feelings that relate to your topic. You will need at least 12 items.

Step 4: Review each of your list ideas. Improve every one of them.

- Add colour
- Remove unnecessary words
- Replace common words with poetic words
- Add descriptive details (sounds, textures, sights, tastes, smells)
- Include feelings
- Take out or change any ideas that you don't like anymore

Step 5: Decide how you will write your poem. How will you put your list in order?

- Will you move from less important things to more important things?
- Will you arrange your poem in chronological order?
- Will you start and end the poem in the same way?
- Will you randomly provide your list?


Step 6: Write your poem.

Activity 1: Food Glorious Food


