#### **Parent Teacher Interviews**

We had a wonderful response to the 'Meet the Teacher' Parent Teacher Interviews last week, with many parents happy to select the Webex/online option to assist with making attendance easier. These sessions conducted in Term 1 are very important as the teacher gets to meet the parents and gather information about their new student that will assist in their social and academic development during the year.

### Inaugural Open Classroom Afternoon – Today!

To complement last week's Parent Teacher Interviews, we are welcoming parents and families into our classroom spaces this afternoon, Thursday March 16<sup>th</sup> 3:30-4:15pm. Hopefully you get a chance to hear and see the wonderful learning your child has been doing, as they take you through their 2023 classroom today.

#### **Numeracy PL for Staff**

Last Friday, the staff participated in professional learning (PL) in the area of the 'Big Ideas in Maths'. Teachers were able to deepen their understanding around 'trusting the count', place value and multiplicative thinking. The session was run by Michael Minus, whose organisation, Love Maths, has been working alongside the staff over the past twelve months. This work aligns directly with our School Strategic Plan (SSP) and this year's Annual Implementation Plan and complements the work that our own Numeracy Key Learning Team has been leading since late 2021.

#### NAPLAN

Year 3 and Year 5 students around Australia are completing NAPLAN at the moment and our students are no exception. The Year 5s completed the online tests over past two days and the Year 3s will finish off their assessments on Friday. Results are expected in late Term 2. As a school we take the results of the NAPLAN assessments with a grain of salt. They are single tests that occur at a specific moment in time. We value what we see from our students every day in the classroom and know that these assessments do not always provide opportunities for students to show what they can really do.

Congratulations to all students who completed NAPLAN this year – you demonstrated outstanding critical thinking and resilience!

#### **Response to Intervention at NLPS**

As part of the school's commitment to ensuring that all of our students are supported in the ways that they need in regard to their academic success, behaviour and wellbeing, the school created a Response to Intervention (RtI) document late last year. The NLPS RtI details the system of supports that our school puts in place to provide high-quality education to ALL our students, which is responsive to their individual needs.

The supports that the school can provide are listed according to the level of intervention – Tier 1 (core instruction for all students), Tier 2 (targeted instruction for 15-20%) and Tier 3 (intensive intervention for 1-5%).


# **Supportive Friends**

Murray to Moyne Bike Ride (M2M)

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

On the week-end of April 1<sup>st</sup> and 2nd 2023, I will be participating in the Murray to Moyne (M2M) Bike ride from Echuca (Murray River) to Port Fairy (Moyne River) in support of the students from our neighbouring local school Altona North Primary. Apart from the challenge and scenery, the ride is also about raising funds to support the student welfare programs at Altona North Primary School.

The ride is a 520km relay event that is conducted over 2 days. The participants and support crew pay all their own expenses (registration, food, travel & accommodation) and all funds raised go directly to the school to give underprivileged students the opportunity to participate in events that develop resilience, a sense of achievement, leadership and respect in a multi-cultural and socially diverse community.

The funds raised will allow the school to provide opportunities for students to attend camps, swimming lessons, excursions, breakfast club, bike education and a host of extra curricula experiences which they would otherwise be deprived of taking part in.

The M2M fundraising also allows the school to provide clothing and food hampers to homeless and families facing difficulties. The Altona Nth PS actively supports its local community both inside and outside of the classroom.

The recent period of COVID has provided even higher levels of disadvantage to those in need and now more than previously we need to provide much needed support in order to help close the gap.

Even though Altona North PS is our neighbouring school, there is significant difference in the level of disadvantage between the 2 schools and your support will go a long way in assisting local children and families in need.
